The Banana Slug, a bright yellow, slimy, shell-less mollusk found in the campus' redwood forest, was the unofficial mascot for UC Santa Cruz's coed teams since the university's early years. The students' adoption of such a lowly creature for a team mascot was their reaction to the fierce athletic competition fostered at most American universities.

In 1980, when some campus teams wanted more organized yet still low-keyed participation in extramural competition, UCSC joined Division III of the NCAA in five sports. UCSC's then chancellor polled the student players, and out of this small group emerged a consensus for a new moniker—the sea lions. But the new name did not find favor with the majority of students, who continued to root for the Slugs.

After five years of dealing with the two-mascot problem, an overwhelming pro-slug straw vote by students in 1986 convinced the chancellor to make the lowly but beloved Banana Slug UCSC's official mascot.

In May 2004, Reader's Digest named the Banana Slug the best college mascot. The Banana Slug even figured in a court case involving campus mascots. Judge Terence Evans, writing the opinion for the Seventh Circuit Court of Appeals, stated the following: "We give the best college nickname nod to the University of California-Santa Cruz. Imagine the fear in the hearts of opponents who travel there to face the imaginatively named 'Banana Slugs?'" (Crue et al. v. Aiken, June 1, 2004)

Crown College Mission Statement & Statement of Community

The mission of Crown College is to promote intellectual, personal and social success and to provide an ethical and inclusive living and learning environment.

In the embracing of this diversity, we find stimulation, freedom, and strength. Freedom to express one's opinions and beliefs is of the utmost importance.

We respect friendship, honesty, community, individual freedom, individual responsibility and academic integrity. Individual freedom in a community requires respect for one another as well as for the beauty of the College and the campus. Academic integrity fosters a positive learning environment and is essential to the functioning of the university.

Responsibility for personal actions, regardless of circumstances is required of every member of our community.

Actions of disrespect or intolerance towards others are not conducive to the academic and social atmosphere we strive to create. Conduct which discriminates on the basis of age, creed, ethnicity, gender, physical ability, political views, race, religion, sexual orientation, social class or other differences will not go unchallenged. Freedom of expression does not mean freedom to violate others' rights or cause harm to any individual or group of individuals. As a community, we should take the responsibility to identify and speak out against such behavior if it occurs.

Per Federal law, all information contained in a student record is considered confidential except: student's name, local telephone, local address, e-mail address, college, major, class level, dates of attendance, number of credits enrolled in the current term, degrees and honors received, name, weight and height of participants on intercollegiate athletic teams.

Alcohol & Drug Policy Expectations

Each year we lose one or more students in alcohol-related deaths, and judicial issues related to substance abuse demand time and attention that could otherwise be spent more productively on the community.

The University of California expects ALL members of the University community to comply with all applicable federal, state, city, and University ordinances and regulations regarding alcohol and other drugs. University policy is published in the UCSC Student Policies and Regulations Handbook and the Crown Student Handbook, which are available online for all students.

In accordance with those policies, College policy specifically prohibits selling, serving, and consuming alcohol at events and/or public areas on the campus. Public places include lounges, stairwells, decks, balconies, classrooms, meeting rooms, recreational facilities, parking lots, and all outdoor areas of the campus. Exceptions must be made by the Chancellor or by those to whom he delegates that authority.

The full explanation and requirements for approval of an event are explained under the College Policies section in this handbook. You are responsible for the behavior of your guests both at events and in general. Alcohol and other drug use/abuse is not an acceptable excuse for actions that damage facilities or individuals (physically or emotionally).

Common source alcohol containers (kegs, party balls, etc.) are strictly prohibited on the campus. Failure to comply with College/campus policies regarding the use of alcohol and other drugs will result in disciplinary action, which may include loss of on-campus housing, suspension, or dismissal.

You should also know that the campus provides a number of educational and support services in these areas: for example, the Cowell Health Center, the Student Health Outreach and Promotion office and Counseling and Psychological Services (CAPS). Crown & Merrill Residential Life Office

To reach us from the Crown Fountain, first walk to the right of Banana Joe's Café towards Merrill College. CROWN CLASSROOM BUILDING

Crown Grounds

We are very lucky to live and work in the middle of a redwood forest. This is one of the few places on earth where the *Sequoia sempervivens* (coast redwood) grow. Here at Crown, we try to maintain a sylvan style of landscaping, using as many native and redwood associated shrubs and flowers as possible. We have many showy displays of flowers in the Spring. The azaleas and rhododendrons are spectacular and be sure to check out the flowering cherries and magnolias in the lower quad.

There is a buffer zone of wild area between the inner road and the main road. We leave it undisturbed as a natural habitat for deer and other wildlife will share space with us. Please be mindful of these considerations during your stay here in order to preserve our delicate environment.

- **TRASH:** Litter is a blight on the landscape. Everything that hits the ground is litter and must be picked up whether it is "biodegradable" or not. Cigarette butts take seven years to decompose and pose a fire hazard. Fruit is not compost, but an attractant for insects and an eyesore. Please bag and tie all trash to prevent injury and death to wild critters who forage in the dumpsters.
- **RECYCLE:** Please put recycling in the proper container and break down cardboard. Everything that is recycled doesn't take up space in the landfill.
- **PATHS:** It is very important to stay on the paved paths. Walking through the landscaping kills the plants and compacts the soil. Walking through the wooded areas causes compaction, which increases runoff and flooding the winter. There is also a lot of poison oak in the woods.
- **SPORTS:** The East Field is the best place to play games that involving running and throwing. Our area is not large enough for strenuous game We request that any games of catch be of the nerf type to avoid damage the landscape plants.

ACADEMICS

As a Crown student you are part of the larger UCSC academic community and subject to campus wide rules and regulations on academic integrity, academic standing, enrollment, and registration. While the Crown academic staff stands ready to help you understand these rules and regulations, you are ultimately responsible for your own education: completing your own enrollment in classes through the Student Portal (located at <http://my.ucsc.edu>) registering and filing petitions on time, understanding policies, meeting course requirements set by instructors, maintaining good academic progress, and successfully completing a degree generally in 12 quarters. Since this can be a complex process, you will want to pay special attention to the publications described below and seek advising early if you are unsure about a policy or your best course of action.

Where to Look for More Information

For registration and enrollment information, you should see the Schedule of Classes published each quarter on the web at <http://reg.ucsc.edu/soc.htm>.

The online searchable Schedule of Classes can be found at my.ucsc.edu. Registration and enrollment are separate functions at UC Santa Cruz. Registration means payment of University fees BEFORE the quarter begins. Enrollment means the actual process of signing up for courses online.

The UCSC General Catalog gives information on degree requirements for each major and minor program and a description of all courses that are offered by the departments (and which quarters they are offered over a two-year cycle). It also provides brief faculty biographies, interests, and specializations. Such catalog information will be especially useful as you decide between different majors, seek faculty mentors, and lay alternative academic plans.

A new version of the General Catalog is published every two years and is available for purchase at the Bay Tree Bookstore on campus or viewable online at <http://reg.ucsc.edu/catalog/> . Updates in odd numbered years are published online only.

The **Navigator** (available online only) is a very useful reference manual for students and advisors alike. It contains information on campus policies, administrative procedures, petitions, waivers, and special campus resources and services. For instance, you will find comprehensive information on the General Education (GE) requirements and what courses may be used to satisfy them. The Navigator contains detailed information on the grading policy and academic standing regulations, including how to monitor your academic progress on a quarter-by-quarter basis so that you do not face academic disqualification. You can find The Navigator online at <http://reg.ucsc.edu/navigator> .

The Student Policies and Regulations Handbook includes campus regulations on academic progress and academic integrity.

Grade Point Average / Class Standing

To make good progress, students are normally expected to take and forty-five credits per academic year (unless approved for part study); 180 credits are required to graduate. Students must maintain a GPA of 2.00 or higher in both their cumulative and their current term to remain in good standing. Academic standing is checked quarterly, after completion of the term. In general, a student should be in GOOD academic standing to serve student member of a University committee, to work as a Resident Assistant (RA), to run for elected office, to qualify for the Education Abroad Program, or to participate on any intercollegiate athletic team. You must maintain a minimum grade point average of 2.00. Failure so could jeopardize your student status at UCSC. Your UCSC GPA is available on the Student Portal. The grade point average is determine by dividing the number of grade points earned by the number of attempted for a letter grade. Grade points are assigned to each grade as shown:

Calculating Grade Points:

A+ = 4.0, A = 4.0, A - = 3.7

B+ = 3.3, B = 3.0, B- = 2.7

C+ = 2.3, C = 2.0

D = 1.0

F=0.0

W/I/IP = 0.0

P/NP = 0.0 (W, I, IP, P, NP are not included in the GPA.)

For example, suppose a student takes three five-unit courses and receives grades of A-, B- and C+:

A- (3.7 x5 = 18.5), B- (2.7 x5 = 13.5), C+ (2.3 x5 =11.5) = 43.5/15 = 2.9 GPA

If you find you are having problems with classes and may not pass, you should make an appointment to see an academic advisor in the Crown Administration Office as soon as possible. Early consultation will give you the most options for choosing a better course load in subsequent quarters. If you fall below good standing (2.00), you will be placed on academic probation and be expected to meet with an advisor to discuss the problems you have encountered and to explore solutions for improving your academic work. Students whose current GPA falls below 1.5 are subject to academic disqualification and may be barred from enrollment or disqualified by the faculty of the College.

If you have general academic questions, come in to the Administration Office during office hours, Monday – Friday, from 8:00am-12:00pm, and 1:00pm-4:00pm, unless otherwise posted.

Core Class/College Requirements

Crown College has one academic requirement of its own: the Crown College Core Course. Crown 80 (and its science component, BME 83) is a graduation requirement for all first-year Crown students and some transfer students, which must be taken during the first quarter (Fall) at UCSC. Normal Course Load and Part-time Study

Part-time study: The standard quarterly course load is 15 credits. Students who are unable to pursue a bachelor's degree on a full-time basis due to family obligations, health restrictions, or continuing permanent employment may be eligible for the Part-Time Program offered through the Office of The Registrar. Students who have been approved for this program may pursue a degree in any major offered at UCSC, enrolling in a maximum of 10 credits each quarter. Part-time study should be planned and approved as far in advance as possible; deadlines occur early in the quarter.

Reduced load without part-time status: Students may enroll in 12-14 credits without the approval of an advisor. Students who wish to enroll in fewer than 12 credits can petition at the College Office. Typically, this type of load is granted for one quarter only in a given year.

Taking an above average course load: 15 credits is the standard full-time course load. Although we recommend that students do not take more than 17 credits per quarter, students may enroll in up to 19 credits without special permission. Students with a cumulative GPA of 3.00 may take up to 22 credits without the approval of an academic advisor.

Honors

Students who excel in their academic careers at UCSC are eligible to receive Honors. Most Departments award Honors in the Major and College Faculty award College Honors for breadth and academic excellence. Students may also be eligible for Dean's Honors and University Honors. These distinctions are based on criteria set by the awarding unit. Any student who has a reportable disciplinary sanction for a violation of academic integrity policies may be ineligible for any honors designation, at the discretion of the agency that awards the designation.

STUDENT CONDUCT

Philosophy of Discipline

Campus and College policies and community standards exist to create a safe and educationally supportive environment for members of our community.

The judicial conduct process seeks to educate students about these expectations as well as to create accountability for when these expectations are not met.

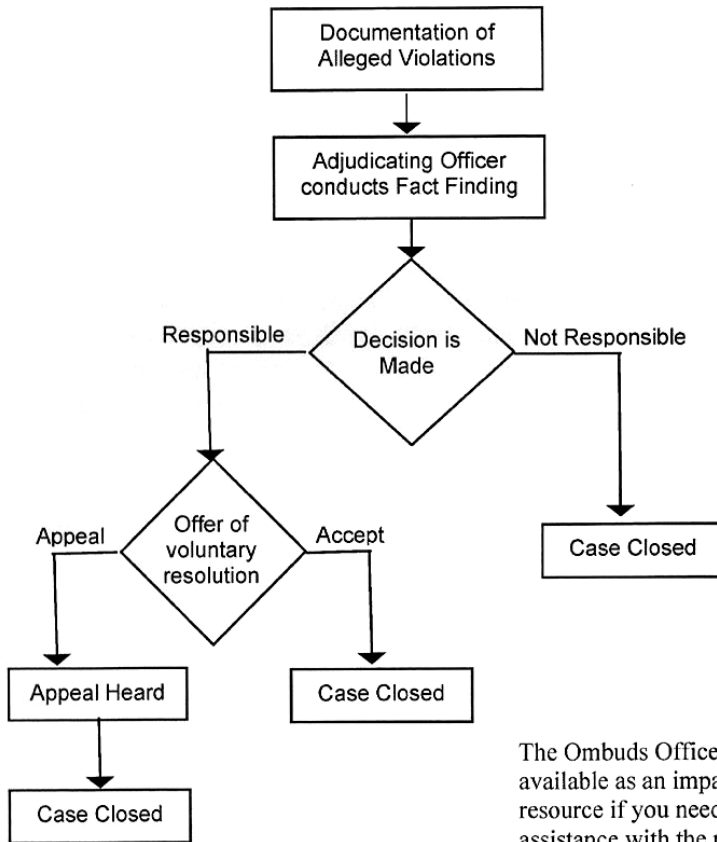
The judicial process is educational and when a student is involved in a policy violation, all previous violations and judicial interactions are taken into account when determining the sanctions, or outcomes. Repeated disciplinary violations may lead to cancellation of a student's housing contract, exclusion from the college, warnings, suspension, or dismissal from the University.

Judicial Process

The College adjudicates disciplinary violations in accordance with the **Student Policies and Regulations Handbook** (available at <http://www2.ucsc.edu/judicial/rulebook.html>).

Judicial Process Definitions

Documentation: Any student, staff or faculty member can submit documentation, generally in the form of an incident report, to the Residential Life Office to report issues of concern or violations of College or University policy.



The Ombuds Office is also available as an impartial resource if you need assistance with the process

Fact Finding: An Adjudicating Officer will then proceed with determining finding of fact. This may include meetings with students, staff or faculty involved in the situation. Additional people may be contacted if information outside the scope of the adjudicating officer is needed (e.g., contacting ResNet for computing violations).

Decision: From the information available and using a ‘Preponderance of Evidence’ standard of proof, a determination will be made as to whether or not a student is responsible for a violation.

- **Responsible:** If a student is found responsible, then the student will be offered a voluntary resolution, which may include University disciplinary sanctions and/or educational sanctions to fulfill. When a student is found responsible he/she may choose to appeal the decision in accordance with the appeal process.
- **Appeal:** If a student appeals, the case will be reviewed by the Appeal Officer (the Appeal Officer will be specified in the decision letter). The Appeal Officer will hear the appeal and may choose to uphold or overturn the decision and uphold, change, or overturn the sanctions.
- **Accept:** If a student accepts the decision of the Adjudicating Officer, the case is closed. If there are accompanying sanctions, these must be completed in the time specified.
- **Not Responsible:** If a student is found not to be responsible, the case is closed.

Standards of Proof: Preponderance of Evidence

It is important to remember that the University is not a court of law. Therefore, when adjudicating a possible violation of college or university policy, college officials utilize what is called preponderance of evidence. Simply stated, preponderance takes into account the evidence available for both sides of a case and makes a judgment in favor of the evidence which is more convincing or is more likely to have occurred.

Fines and Sanctions

Students found responsible for conduct violations will find themselves at some level of discipline in the conduct system, and they may be required to fulfill an educational sanction and/or pay monetary restitution. Sanctions are issued to help educate students about the rationale behind the policy they violated and to encourage them to consider the consequences before repeating a policy violation. Sanctions range in severity from a warning letter to removal from the University. Philosophically, we follow a policy of using educational sanctions rather

than simple punitive sanctions or monetary fines, but there are situations where restitution must be made. Educational sanctions can include a variety of options including presenting a program, writing a research paper, or attending the Community Solutions Workshop. Fines would be levied for any vandalism or damage caused to university or personal property, and/or for fineable violations (i.e. tampering with fire equipment, skateboarding, etc.).

Please be aware that a disciplinary record may affect your eligibility for a variety of programs including EAP or future university housing.

Appeal Process

A student may choose to appeal a decision made by a sanctioning body. An appeal letter and form available at

<http://www2.ucsc.edu/judicial/forms.html> and must be received by the Appeal Officer designated in the student's resolution letter within five days of receiving the decision (or by date given in letter). Only one level of appeal is permitted and reasons must be based on the following:

1. Whether there is substantial evidence, which contradicts the finding(s) of violation of University policies or campus regulations for which the discipline was imposed.
2. Whether there is evidence which could not be adduced at the time the original hearing which is likely to change the result.
3. Whether there was not procedural fairness at the conduct of the hearing.
4. Whether the sanction imposed was too harsh given the findings of fact.

Summary

University sanction levels are listed progressively, however, a student's actions may warrant contract cancellation for a first offense. There is a great deal of flexibility in the process, which is up to the discretion of the Adjudicating Officer. This flexibility however does not take away from the student's right to due process. Students are given written notice of violations in advance of a meeting with a staff member, the ability to share their information of the incident with the Adjudicating Officer or body, and the right to appeal the decision. All disciplinary records will be kept on file at the College for at least 7 years.

COLLEGE POLICIES

It is the responsibility of each individual to know and abide by the Rules, Regulations and Policies of the College and the University. Read **The Student Policies and Regulations Handbook**, **University Terms & Conditions of College Residence**, **The College Handbook**, and all official newsletters, flyers, and mailings for info regarding policies on student conduct and academic integrity.

In order to carry on its work of teaching, research, and public service, the University has an obligation to maintain conditions under which the work of the University can proceed freely. This is done in accordance with the highest standards of quality, institutional integrity, and freedom of expression, and with full recognition by all concerned, of the rights and privileges, as well as the responsibilities, of those who comprise the University community. Each member of the UCSC community shares the responsibility of maintaining an environment conducive to the achievement of the University's purposes.

The University's standard of conduct consists of system-wide policies, campus regulations, and individual College rules. The Chancellor has delegated authority to the Provosts, College Administrative Officers, Dean of Graduate Studies and Research, and Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs or their designees to impose discipline for violation of these policies, regulations, and rules.

This list complements the University policies. It is the responsibility of each individual to know and abide by the rules, regulations and policies of Crown College and the University.

Any violation of any College and/or University policy can lead to disciplinary action.

ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Academic Integrity is the cornerstone of a university education.

PRINCIPLES:

- 1) Academic misconduct includes but is not limited to cheating, fabrication, plagiarism, or facilitating academic dishonesty or as further specified in campus regulations.
- 2) Instructors shall make a reasonable effort to explain to students at the outset of a course the behavior that is expected of them when taking examinations or preparing and submitting other course work.
- 3) In the event that academic misconduct is suspected, due process shall be respected.
- 4) All members of the university community who suspect academic dishonesty should report it to the instructor of record. If the instructor of record is unavailable, or the case is outside the scope of the course, it should be reported to the chairperson of the department sponsoring the course. If so desired by the student, the chairperson will maintain the student's identity in strict personal confidence, even at the expense of dropping the case.
- 5) The instructor of record is responsible for recommending the academic sanctions to be imposed. Academic sanctions may include reduced scores on assignment(s), a reduced grade in the course, or failure of the course.
- 6) Disciplinary sanctions are determined by the Provost of the student's College, or, if the student's case goes to a hearing, by the Academic Tribunal. Sanctions range from a letter of censure to dismissal from the University.
- 7) The decision of the Academic Tribunal is final. Appeals to the Chancellor will be considered only for alleged violation of due process.
- 8) In a case of academic misconduct involving more than one student, Provosts will coordinate their decisions to ensure that disciplinary sanctions are applied fairly.
- 9) No grade notation or narrative evaluation will be issued until the process outlined is completed and a final decision is made on the charge and the sanctions to be imposed. The student may appeal the academic sanctions (grade or narrative evaluation) imposed by the instructor, through the Narrative Evaluations Student Grievance Committee.
- 10) In serious cases in which academic misconduct has been determined to occur, a notation of misconduct shall be entered for a specified period on a student's transcript, including all external copies.

AERIAL OBJECTS

Because of the danger to others, dropping or throwing any objects out of or at the buildings is strictly prohibited. Frisbees, softballs and similar objects should not be thrown down hallways or stairways. Violations of this policy will lead to disciplinary action.

ALCOHOL

- State law prohibits the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages by anyone under the age of 21. College policy complements the University policy on alcohol and both support the State law.
- University policy states that alcohol consumption is not allowed in public areas including the Courtyard, Dining Hall, Crown/Merrill Community Room, individual apartment balconies, or any outdoor areas.
- Federal and State laws prohibit alcoholic beverages from being sold, furnished, possessed by, or given to any person under the age of 21. In addition, no possession or transport of open containers, or consumption of alcoholic beverages will be allowed in public areas by any person, regardless of age or College affiliation.
- Kegs or other "common source" containers holding alcoholic beverages are not allowed on campus. Violation of this policy may result in immediate contract cancellation in addition to other disciplinary action.
- Alcohol in a "private" area but visible from a public area, is considered "in public" and therefore is a violation of policy. For example, an open residence hall room door makes the room "public" because it is visible from the hall.
- Alcohol is not allowed in rooms or apartments in which all of the residents are under the age of 21. This means that even if you are over the age of 21, you will not be allowed to consume, store, or be in possession of alcoholic beverages in rooms or apartments which all residents are under the age of 21.

- Any person under the age of 21 found to be under the influence alcohol is in violation of University policy.
- Alcohol may not be served at any College parties or events.
- No University funds may be spent for alcohol.
- No written notices (posters, ads, etc.) may be circulated announcing the availability of alcohol at an event.
- Also refer to The Student Policies and Regulations Handbook, The Terms and Conditions (Housing Contract) and any residential staff member if you have questions

ALCOHOL AND OTHER DRUG "TROPHIES" AND PARAPHERNALIA

Emptied containers of alcohol and other paraphernalia are considered evidence of policy violations. Residents may not have these materials in their rooms. These materials include alcohol bottles and cans, pipes, water bong, and hookahs.

ANIMALS/PETS

No pets (except fish who live underwater in an aquarium 10 gallons or smaller) are allowed in the College residential community.

BEHAVIOR

As a student of UC Santa Cruz and Crown College, you are expected to act maturely and with common sense. Any students who, by virtue of actions, are considered a danger to themselves or other community members, or who refuse intervention for a situation harmful to themselves or others, may be asked to leave and/or be restricted from the college and residential areas.

CANCELLATION of HOUSING

The housing contract is binding for the entire academic year.

Prior to taking residence: If plans change, the student must log in to <http://studenthousing.ucsc.edu> to cancel the application/contract. Cancellation fees may apply.

After taking residence: Requests for housing contract cancellation will only be considered according to Section VII of the Terms and Conditions. Some valid reasons to cancel: if the student graduates; if the student withdraws; if the student is registered in a field study program outside of Santa Cruz County; if the student marries; or if the student receives special College permission. If approved, the University may still charge a \$200 cancellation fee. Moving out or turning in keys without official approval does not constitute termination of the housing contract.

CANDLES, INCENSE, AND OPEN FLAMES

The use of candles, incense, lanterns and any open flame devices are strictly prohibited.

CHARGES

Charges for damages will be based on the cost of the material and labor needed to repair the damage.

The student is individually liable for loss or damage to his/her assigned residence and its furnishings and will be held jointly and individually liable for damage to the entire residence unit or apartment, not just his or her living space, in accordance with College policy unless proof of individual responsibility is made.

CHECKING-IN / CHECKING-OUT

- UCSC Staff will make initial inspections and write any preexisting damages on the RCF. The resident is responsible for making any additional notes and turning in the RCF right away to the Residential Education Office.
- All residents are held jointly responsible for the common areas of the room/apt, and therefore these areas should be reviewed by all roommates/housemates. Once the RCF has been completed, it must be signed by the resident of the room/apt. Any new residents who move into an apartment after the beginning of Fall Quarter must also fill out a RCF. Failure to turn in the RCF could result in later charges for any damage in the room/apartment.

- Room Condition Forms must also be completed whenever a student moves out of a room/apartment. The procedure for checking-out is the same as checking-in. It is the student's responsibility to have the room inspected by the Resident Assistant (RA) or Coordinator Residential Education (CRE). Any damage found in a room/apartment at the time of departure, and not noted on the RCF from check-in, will be billed directly to the student(s) in question.
- Sometimes previously undetected damage is discovered after official check-out is complete when facilities experts re-inspect rooms. Residents will be charged for any damages not noted as existing on the RCF. Detailed Checkout instructions will be distributed to residents.
- Failure to follow all Checkout procedures will result in a fine.

COMBUSTIBLE MATERIAL

Under the fire code, no combustible or flammable material, e.g. gasoline, chemicals, and propane, may be stored at Crown or anywhere near residential facilities. For more information, contact residential staff.

CONCEALMENT OF VIOLATIONS

Residents have the responsibility to report policy violations. Concealment of such violations or failure to comply with the requests made by college officials in the course of their duties may result in judicial action.

COURTESY/QUIET HOURS

In order to preserve the academic and community standards of Crown College, noise levels must be held to a minimum (referred to as "Courtesy Hours"). Courtesy hours are expected to be maintained 24 hours a day by all students and their guests, due to the intermingling of classrooms among the residential buildings and our densely populated living spaces. Remember, you have chosen to live in residence halls and apartments designed to provide a quiet, studious environment. Additionally, "Quiet Hours" for the residence hall and apartment communities are listed below. During these times no noise, including music, television, or voices should be heard outside your room or apartment. If your noise is bothersome to another member of the community and you are asked to lower the volume or cease the activity, it is in your best interest to comply with the request in order to avoid judicial action.

RESIDENCE HALL QUIET HOURS

Sunday - Thursday: from 10:00pm - 8:00am

Friday: from 1:00am Saturday morning to 10:00am Saturday

Saturday: from 1:00am Sunday morning to 10:00am Sunday

APARTMENT QUIET HOURS

Quiet Hours are expected to be maintained at all times with the exception of the times below:

Daily (Sunday-Thursday) between 5:00pm and 8:00pm

Weekends (Friday & Saturday nights) between 5:00pm and 1:00am

The above C/M apartment hours are considered social times.

In all residential areas, "24 Hour Quiet Hours" occur during final exam periods. The days and times will be posted, and failure to comply may result in disciplinary action.

DAMAGE

Any person causing damage to University property will be billed commensurate with the destruction. Serious or repeated violations may lead to housing contract cancellation or other disciplinary action.

In addition to being charged for damages, students will be asked to cease the action or use of the item(s) that may be causing the damage(s).

DANGEROUS ITEMS

Firearms, paint-ball, BB, or pellet guns, knives, and other dangerous items, even for display purposes, are prohibited by Federal, State, local and University regulations. Possession of any dangerous items may result in judicial action by the College and possible criminal action as dictated by law.

DECORATING

If you wish to hang things on the wall to decorate a residence hall or apartment room you can use push pins or picture hangers. Please do not use nails or screws because of the damage that will occur to the walls and paint. Self-adhesive foam tape also causes serious damage to wall surfaces when removed. It may not be used to hang posters or other decoration.

Excessive damage to room walls and paint will lead to the resident(s) of the room being charged for repair. For all areas that are considered public and/or semi-private, you must get prior approval from the Coordinator for Residential Education. Tapestries or cloth cannot be hung on walls or ceilings, as these materials are extremely hazardous during a fire.

DOORS/ LOCKS

It is a violation of College policy to put anything on residence hall room doors or apartment entry doors. In addition, dismantling, defeating or tampering with door closing/locking mechanisms are also prohibited. Students may be subject to disciplinary action, including damage charges.

DRUGS

The University and College adhere to all Federal, State, and local laws. The University strictly prohibits the possession, sale, or transportation of any illicit drugs. Violation of this policy will result in judicial action and possible legal action being taken.

Any person found to be under the influence of any controlled substances is in violation of College policy.

Unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, use, sale of, or the attempted manufacture, distribution, dispensing, or sale of controlled substances, identified in Federal and State law or regulations, is strictly against university policy.

DRUG PARAPHERNALIA

Delivering, furnishing, transferring, manufacturing, and possessing paraphernalia is strictly prohibited anywhere on the grounds of College. Drug paraphernalia is defined here as all equipment, material, products intended for use or designed for use in growing, processing, harvesting, storing, concealing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing a controlled substance into the human body. For further information on this policy please refer to a residential staff person. Examples of paraphernalia include, but are not limited to: pipes, water pipes, bongs, and hookahs.

EVENT POLICY

An event is defined as either: a gathering of students where there are five or more people in a residence hall single, seven or more people in a residence hall double, triple, quad loft, or 10 or more people in a C/M apartment; and/or when the gathering may have some impact on the surrounding community (for example, noise levels are expected to be louder than normal).

Students are required to contact a Student Life member (CRE, RA, or CSO) whenever they are planning an event. Residents are prohibited by Federal, State, local laws, and College policies, from having alcohol or other drugs at events in University facilities. Violation of the event policy or other policies will result in the event being shut down and/or other judicial action.

Students must notify their respective RA at least 48 hours in advance if they are planning an event. For events held in a College public area (courtyard, dining hall, etc.) see the College Programs Coordinator (CPC.)

Impromptu events must also be approved by the building/cluster RA or the CSO (if RA is not available). Residents must contact a staff member as soon as it is evident an event will be taking place.

Any students sponsoring or hosting an event are responsible for their guests' behavior, and for any related damages or problems that may arise.

FEDERAL/STATE LAWS

The University abides by all Federal, State, and local laws. It is the responsibility of each member of the Community to know and follow any applicable laws.

FIRE ALARMS

If a resident fails to evacuate a residence hall/apartment when a general fire alarm is sounding it could be considered a violation of the housing contract and may result in disciplinary action.

FIRE SAFETY/EQUIPMENT

Tampering with smoke detectors, fire alarm stations, fire extinguishing devices, or door closures, is prohibited; such actions will result in disciplinary action and a possible fine. See the Fire Safety section under Safety and Security for more detailed information. The College has established evacuation plans in case of fire; information is provided in your building/apartment.

FURNITURE

Furniture may not be removed from any residence room, apartment or common area, nor may it be placed outside on balconies or patios.

Students found in possession of furniture other than what was assigned to their room/apt, may be charged for its disposal.

Residents found with dismantled furniture without College permission (CRE/Maintenance Supervisor/ACAO) will be charged for all costs related to making the furniture safe (up to and including replacement costs).

Beds in the residence halls at Crown can be adjusted and still remain safe.

Please contact a Residential or Maintenance Staff member if you are interested in adjusting your bed. Because all beds require tools to be assembled correctly and there is the possibility of parts being lost or damaged, residents are not permitted to make the adjustments without consulting with the appropriate College Staff member. The Maintenance Staff are the only ones who can adjust beds or change furniture in the apartments. The residents are responsible for the furniture in their room and can be charged for its replacement and/or reassembly costs.

GUESTS

The Terms and Conditions states that a student may have a guest stay in his or her room/apartment for a maximum of 3 consecutive nights or 15 total nights per academic year. Please clear all guests with your roommate(s)/housemates and let your Resident Assistants know that you are going to be having visitors. Any student providing housing for guests in violation of this policy may be subject to disciplinary action. Residents will be held responsible for their guests' actions.

Residence Hall residents may have their guest(s) stay in the lounges of their building by exception only. However the rights of residents who wish to study prevail over guests. Each building will set up their building's criteria at the beginning of the year. Use of the lounge for overnight guest(s) must have prior approval from a residential staff member (CRE), and a sign with the date and approval must be hung on the lounge door.

HALOGEN LAMPS

Due to the high risk of fire, all halogen lamps are prohibited in residential facilities. Please use other types of lamps for your desk light needs.

HARASSMENT

Physical and verbal harassment will not be tolerated by students, staff, or faculty and is prohibited on the UCSC campus and within the Crown College Community. If any form of harassment occurs, you should notify a staff member immediately. It is the policy of Crown College and the University that the working and learning environment shall be free of harassment, including any form of sexual harassment. Crown College and the University will take action to eliminate harassment. For further information on sexual harassment, please refer to the Student Policies and Regulations Handbook or contact the campus Title IX Officer, Rita Walker, at 459-2462.

IDENTIFICATION

Students are required to carry identification with them at all times. When asked by a college official (any staff or faculty member), proof of identification must be shown. Failure to do so is considered non-compliance with the request of a college official and disciplinary action will be taken.

INSPECTIONS

There are several kinds of inspections that are done during the year in both the residence halls and the C/M Apartments. All apartments have quarterly cleaning inspections. All residential areas (including rooms/apartments) have a yearly fire safety inspection. Residence halls have break inspections; and all residential areas (including rooms/apartments) have security inspections. For detailed information refer to the Residential Life Office.

KEYS

Residents will receive keys (entry and room key for Residence Halls, or entry key for Apartments) upon their check-in on move-in day.

The Crown/Merrill Apartment bedroom doors do not lock. While the external door is locked for the residents' safety, internal bedroom doors are not equipped with locks.

Residential Halls will switch to a different external building entry door locks during the Winter Break college closure. This means that once all residents leave in December, they will not be permitted to re-enter the residence hall buildings until the re-opening day in the first week of January. At that time the doors will have their locks returned to the original settings.

There are replacement costs associated with replacing lost keys. Any lost keys, including Residential Room Keys, Music Practice Room Keys, Bicycle Storage Keys, and Gauss Kitchen keys will cost a minimum of \$100 to be replaced. The Residence Hall external building keys are ordered and cut in larger quantities and will instead cost \$15 to replace.

Residential keys must be returned to the appropriate staff member upon check-out. Any lost, stolen, or damaged keys must be returned to the Residential Life Office immediately. If discovered after office hours, the student must report the missing keys the next business day.

Failure to properly return residential keys will result in a key replacement fee. As per the housing contract, the student agrees not to copy their keys and not to let anyone else use them.

If a resident is locked out of a Residence Hall or Apartment, she/he should go to the Residential Life Office to check out a Lock-Out Key temporarily. If it is after business hours and the office is closed, then the resident should contact an RA or CSO for assistance.

Students must carry keys and ensure that their door is secured at all times when they are not present. If a student locks him/herself out more than three times in an academic year, there will be a service fee of \$15 upon the fourth lockout, and a similar fee upon every subsequent lock out.

LITTER

It is a community goal to make the College and UCSC a litter-free environment. Anyone found throwing garbage out of his or her room/apartment (into trees, bushes, ground cover, paths, etc.) will be subject to disciplinary action.

MURAL GUIDELINES

Please refer to a RA or CRE for guidelines on residential mural painting.

MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS

Musical instruments are allowed in the residential facilities, but their use must conform to established courtesy/quiet hour policies. The playing of amplified instruments is not permitted in the residential facilities. Amplified instruments may only be played in the Cultural Center at Merrill. For more information on scheduling practice space for bands, please contact the Special Projects Coordinator.

A music practice room is available to a limited number of Crown students. If you are interested in a key for the practice room, please contact the Residential Life Office.

PAINTING

Residents are prohibited from painting any property of the University (see exception under Mural Guidelines). It is considered vandalism and subject to disciplinary action (including damage charges).

PAYMENT OF FEES

The Student Housing Services Office, located at 104 Hahn Student Services handles all payments of housing fees. They can be contacted at (831) 459-2394 for information on deferred payment plans and other issues regarding housing fees.

QUARTER BREAK ACCOMMODATIONS

Please consult the UCSC Terms and Conditions for break periods covered in the housing contract. Residents may be able to make special arrangements to stay in residence during periods when classes are not in session. Dining Services will not be available during these periods. To find out which time periods you may remain in residence between academic quarters, contact the Crown Housing Coordinator.

RECYCLING

UCSC has an active recycling program. Recycling centers at Crown are located by the Admin Office, C/M Community Room, and Dining Hall.

NOTE: Batteries, computer monitors, fluorescent tubes, toner cartridges, containers filled with household chemicals and other e-waste are considered hazardous waste and should never be put into dumpsters. Contact Maintenance at <http://fixit.ucsc.edu> to properly dispose of items.

ROOM SWITCHING

Switching residential rooms is not automatically approved because Crown staff feel that an important aspect of the college experience is learning how to coexist with a diverse group of people. If you are having problems, roommate mediation with your RA is always the first option presented to roommates/housemates. If you are interested in switching rooms, please speak to your building RA first. You may be referred to your Coordinate Residential Education or the Housing Coordinator to facilitate a change of room/apartment.

Unauthorized room switching is not allowed for many reasons: 1) the College cannot contact you in case of an emergency; 2) you may be charged for damages you may not have done; and 3) you may not be billed appropriately for your room. If you make an unauthorized switch, you will need to return to your original room before a permanent change will be made, and an improper room change fee may be charged.

SMOKING

In accordance with the UCSC Policy, all residence halls and apartments are smoke-free. Smoking is prohibited inside the residence (including student rooms) as well as residence hall lounges, individual apartments, community rooms, lounges, cafes and dining halls. Additionally, smoking is prohibited in all indoor public spaces at UCSC - both academic and residential. This no smoking policy includes exterior stairways, decks and balconies.

Smoking outside is permitted only in designated areas, 25 feet from all buildings/ air intakes. There are designated smoking areas around the College, located near ash cans.

STORAGE

Additional storage is not available, except for what will reasonably fit within each residence hall room or individual apartment.

WATER FIGHTS

"Water fights," or similar activities with water balloons, water guns, soaker type devices, pails or any other objects containing water or other liquids, are prohibited in all areas of the College.

SAFETY ISSUES

SECURITY

In the evenings (from 7:00pm to 3:00am), the College is patrolled by Community Safety Officers (CSOs) who are in direct contact with the UC Police and Fire Departments through radio. They are responsible for securing the College classrooms, offices, and residential areas. Residence Halls are secured 24 hours/day, 7 days/week.

If you find yourself locked out or if you should require the assistance of a CSO, contact campus dispatch by dialing x92100 from a campus phone or by calling (831) 459-2100 from other phones and ask for a CSO.

In addition to CSOs, the University provides Kiosk Guards at the front gates after 8:00pm daily in order to close the campus to all but invited guests. The University is also equipped with its own deputized Police Department that responds to emergencies 24 hours a day. The Campus Police may be contacted for non-emergencies by dialing (831) 459-2231, by dialing x92231 on any University phone, or by using any of the phones designated by a blue light. Blue light phones require no phone number and will automatically place you in contact with the police. If you feel threatened or need any type of emergency assistance while you are outdoors, use the blue light phones. It is helpful to familiarize yourself with their locations before you need to use them.

THEFT

The majority of thefts are preventable. To protect yourself:

- Always close your residence door behind you.
- Lock your windows at night or before you leave your room.
- Leave your valuables at your permanent family home.
- For those valuables that you do bring to campus, have them insured and/or engraved with your name.

- When in the library or dining hall, do not leave your belongings (book bag, keys, wallet, cellphone, laptop, etc.) unattended.

- If at any time you see a suspicious person in or around the residential areas please call the CSOs on duty during the evening hours. They are they are trained to investigate any unusual situations. During the day, contact the University Police at (831) 459-2231, or x92231 from a campus phone.
- Remember that all students are required to carry ID and be easily identified. It is your right to know who is in your residential area. Residence Halls and Apartment Buildings are considered private, not public, areas and are open to Crown residents, their invited guests, and University personnel for University business only.
- Get to know your neighbors. This will help you to identify who belongs there, and who does not.
- Never lend your room, apartment, or building key out to anyone else.
- Secure bicycles at all times with a U-type lock. The safest places for bikes are: in a bike storage room, locked; or on a designated rack locked. Do not lock your bikes to light poles or stairway railings. This is a safety hazard and may result in the destruction of your lock and the confiscation of your bike. If you have a vehicle on campus, a steering wheel lock and a pull-out stereo are suggested. For motorcycles or scooters, a U-type lock should be used to help prevent theft.

The University is not responsible for items stolen from your residence. It is your responsibility to keep your personal belongings secure. You may also want to invest in renter's insurance in case of loss or damage to your belongings.

EARTHQUAKES

UC Santa Cruz is located next to several active fault lines. Therefore, it is important to be aware that a major earthquake is always a possibility. The following tips may help you to be more prepared.

During the quake:

1. Stay calm.
2. If you are indoors, remain there until the shaking stops. You should find cover under sturdy furniture or under a door jam. Keep well away from windows.
3. If you are outdoors, move away from any buildings, poles, trees, and power lines into a clear area.
4. Shield yourself against flying debris by covering your head with anything that will shield you from debris, dust or splinters.

After the Quake:

1. Leave the building by following the evacuation plan posted in each building. Do not use an elevator if the building is so equipped.
2. Move away from buildings and any other hazards.
3. Do not re-enter buildings immediately after the quake. Wait for University personnel to allow you back in. There may be aftershocks that can be as or more powerful than the original quake.

FIRE

- Be familiar with your building's escape plan (Posted inside your room/apartment, and in the common hallways).
- Close your room door and any hallway doors on your way out. This precaution will help to control the spread of the fire.
- Before reentering the building, wait for an All-Clear sign from the Fire Department or other University official (Residence Hall/ Apartment staff, etc.).

UCSC Fire Safety Policy

The following fire safety policies are intended to prevent injuries to members of the university residential communities. All residences will be inspected periodically by university staff to ensure that the following fire safety violations (acts, use, or practices), are not present in both the private rooms and common areas of the living unit. When violations are noted, residents will be asked to correct the violation. Continued violations may result in a referral to the student judicial system and will be addressed as a housing contract violation. Pending adjudication, residents may have their housing contract canceled. If you should have questions about these policies, contact a Residential Staff Member, College Administrative Officer, or Fire Chief.

The Use of the Following Hazardous Appliances are Not Allowed:

- tubular type Halogen lamps
- hot plates in areas other than kitchens are prohibited
- toaster ovens in areas other than kitchens are prohibited
- electric heaters not equipped with automatic "tip-over" switch
- non-UL listed appliances

The Use of Open Flames are Not Allowed:

- candles
- kerosene lamps
- stoves or similar items
- use of barbecues on balconies, patios or within 20 feet of a building

Electrical Hazards Such as the Following are Not Allowed:

- overloaded receptacles (use of "octopus" power adapters)
- use of unapproved extension cords (e.g. non-overcurrent protected and exceeding 6 feet in length)
- electrical cords nailed or stapled to walls
- missing or broken electrical wall plates
- inadequate/substandard splices of electrical cords
- incandescent bulbs such as those used in holiday lights

Excessive Combustible Materials are Not Allowed:

- excessive disorderly conditions and the storage of excessive amounts of paper, cardboard, boxes, newspaper, etc.
- partitions or wall paneling installed by residents
- excessive decorations, tapestries, posters, or other wall coverings
- tapestries not tacked tightly to walls
- tapestries or other combustible decorations attached to ceilings
- combustible waste containers
- fireworks, explosives, ammunition

The Storage of Flammable or Combustible Liquids is Not Allowed:

- gasoline, kerosene, charcoal starter, turpentine, laboratory chemicals, or similar substances
- motorized vehicles (mopeds, motorcycles, motorbikes), or gasoline powered equipment

Tampering with or Impacting fire protection equipment is not Allowed:

- smoke detectors covered, blocked, disabled or tampered with
- fire sprinkler heads operationally compromised by presence of tape, paint, hanging material or obstructions
- items hanging on sprinkler piping (bicycles, plants, stereo speakers, clothing, etc.)
- activity which impacts the functioning of any automatic door closure mechanism

Tampering with or Impacting Fire Walls, Ceilings and Doors is

Not Allowed:

- holes which penetrate walls, ceilings and doors
- other damage
- automatic door closing mechanisms disabled or bypassed (door propped open)
- impacting exit ways is not allowed
- obstructing corridors, stairwells, lobbies, or exit doors by storage, furniture, etc.
- storing combustible materials in corridors, stairwells, lobbies or exit areas
- tampering with, obstructing or vandalizing exit lights
- obstruction of or tampering with fire protection devices/equipment (fire alarm pull stations, hose cabinets, fire extinguishers, sprinkler heads)
- failure to leave the facility during the sounding of the alarm

MOUNTAIN LIONS

Mountain lions are large wild cats seen in many parts of California. Though generally reclusive, mountain lions do live on our campus. These animals are occasionally seen by people.

Never approach a mountain lion! This is especially true if the adult is feeding or with her kittens. They are normally shy and elusive animals. Mountain lions would rather avoid confrontations than be involved in one.

To reduce your chances of encountering a mountain lion, hike in a group and make plenty of noise.

Take the following steps if you do encounter a mountain lion:

1. Stay calm. Do not run away or turn your back on the animal. If possible, back away slowly. Running away or moving too fast may stimulate the lion to chase and attack.
2. Stand upright and make eye contact with the mountain lion.
3. Raise your arms and do all that you can to appear larger. Wave your arms, and speak in a loud, deep voice. Throw items at the lion, without crouching down or turning your back on it.
4. If the mountain lion does decide to attack you, fight back! Make sure you are standing on your two feet and facing the animal at all times. Fight back with sticks, jackets, bare hands, etc.

Please report all Mountain Lion sightings on or near the UCSC Campus, as well as discovery of any animal carcass that could be attributed to a Mountain Lion kill.

TICKS

Ticks are arachnids that attach themselves and suck the blood from other creatures, including humans. When the tick punctures the skin, its saliva transmits organisms, potentially giving its victims a tick-borne disease.

How to protect yourself from ticks:

- Know where to expect the ticks. Ticks are often found in the woodlands and grasslands on campus.
- Tuck your pant legs into your socks. This will prevent ticks from crawling up inside your pant legs.
- Use a repellent with DEET (safe for skin and clothing). Always follow the product instructions!
- Wear light-colored clothing, so that you are able to see ticks crawling on your clothing.

Be sure to check for ticks. After coming from a hike, it is best to give yourself a tick check. A bath or shower will not remove or drown an attached tick. The most effective tick checks are not visual, but tactile.

Below are some tips to safely remove a tick:

Step 1: Find a pair of sharp tweezers.

Step 2: Using the tweezers, carefully grasp the tick at the base of the mouthpart.

Step 3: Gently pull the tick straight out. Do not twist, rub, or squish the tick! If you do not pull the tick straight out, there is a possibility that the tick will inject its bacteria and parasites into your body.
